PM's 'At the Rainbow's Edge' to Enrich Caribbean History

The region has a long way to go in developing a full appreciation of the importance of books, reading and intellectual property rights.

This view was amplified by Ian Randall, owner of one of the most reputable Publishing Houses in the Caribbean. His company recently published Prime Minister, Dr. Kenny Anthony's first book 'At the Rainbow's Edge', which was launched last Friday, March 5. Mr. Randall described the launch of the book as a celebration of the process of publishing development in the Caribbean.

Mr. Randall contends that there is a lesson in the contents of Caribbean history books that should serve well for contemporary Caribbean leaders, who owe it to future generations to record their contributions for the purposes of history, education and research material. He lamented that due to limited writings in earlier times, little is known about the sterling contributions made by past Caribbean pioneers, such as Norman Manley, Grantley Adams, and Alexander Bustamante, among many others, whose legacy remains sketchy to the generation of today.

So for me, it is an opportunity to reflect on the past and like each and everyone of you, who will go through the pages of this book, I too, over the next few days will go through those speeches again and ask myself whether I have been faithful to the vision that I have shared with the people of Saint Lucia".

EDITORIAL At the Rainbow's Edge: A First

Prime Minister, Dr. Kenny Anthony registered a first on March 5, 2004 when he became the only seating regional leader to have his work published in the form of a book. The publication entitled "At the Rainbow's Edge," is a compilation of some of the most memorable speeches delivered by Dr. Anthony within the local, regional and international fora since assuming the leadership of the Saint Lucia Labour Party and as Prime Minister of Saint Lucia.

Launched at the Prime Minister's official residence at Vigie, critics say the publication is arguably the most comprehensive overview of the current administration's policies on some of the major domestic, regional and international issues. On March 8, five families, who are housed at the Rose Hill Community Centre following a fire, which destroyed their homes were presented with items of clothing and toiletries provided by the Catholic Church/Caritas Antilles, a Catholic charity and relief organisation of Latin America and the Caribbean. The assistance came as a response to the NCF's plea on behalf of the victims during its telethon on February 29. Head of the NCF's Homeless Committee Andrew "Secra" Gibson told the fire victims to take comfort in the level of concern the public was showing in their time of need.

Father Michel of the Cathedral Archdiocese told the families that all was not lost, as they were all alive today. "A fire destroys everything, even important memories, photographs and special things that have been given to you and we understand that, but I think what we have to be most grateful for is that there was no loss life involved", he said

Positive Response to Telepoll Survey

The national telepoll survey undertaken by the Saint Lucia Solid Waste Management Authority has been met with overwhelming public cooperation. So says Acting Public Relations Officer for the Authority, Emlyn Jean.

On Wednesday March tenth, Ms. Jean told the GIS that at the half-way mark, the telephone operators conducting the survey had not encountered any difficulties in soliciting information from the targeted households. The telephone operators begin interviews at 8:00 a.m. daily, covering some 50 households, island wide. would also seek the feedback of residents on the issues of derelict vehicles and waste management, she said.

The findings of the survey will enable the authority to build on its strengths and address any weaknesses in the service offered to the public. "We think it's also an opportunity for the public to be part of the decision making process, because the service that we offer at the Authority is really an essential service, and if not adequately met, could have serious implications for our health and the health of our environment".

Ms. Jean explained that the information gathering exercise would assist the Solid Waste Management Authority in determining the public's level of satisfaction on the issues of garbage collection, regularity of service, waste management practices displayed by residents of their communities and the problem of illegal dumping. The Authority Residents throughout the island are asked to continue to give their full cooperation to the week-long survey which ends on Sunday. The Authority has given the assurance that all information obtained will be held in strict confidence. The survey is being conducted via the telephone and is facilitated by Cable and Wireless. The National Development Corporation (NDC) began the first of a three stage process for the development of a strategic plan to guide its work for the next three to five years.

The first event, a two-day strategic planning retreat opened at the Royal St. Lucian Hotel today. The meeting brought together representatives of all sectors of the economy for what NDC's General Manager, Wayne Vitalis says should be frank and open discussions for the beginning of an aggressive investment promotion policy to guide the work of the corporation.

Mr Vitalis promised the exercise would not be another talk shop, but would inform a final policy document in keeping with the NDC's ment of St. Lucia. He said that the retreat was a first step to building meaningful relationships foremost with local partners, as investment promotion was everyone's business.

The NDC General Manager said that the challenge was great in a competitive and expensive investment promotion environment.

Mr Vitalis said that the 2-day retreat would survey the critical elements of the investment promotion process, with a view to identifying strengths and weaknesses, and opportunities and threats for St. Lucia.

In a televised address to the nation on the occasion of International Women's Day on Monday, March 8th, Health Minister Honourable Damien Greaves said that the Ministry of Health remained committed to addressing the many issues affecting women. The issue of violence against women was cited as one requiring special attention as a public health problem.

"There is abundant evidence on the impact of violence on women in a range of adverse health effects", said Minister Greaves, informing that specific patterns of injuries had been identified, such as

head, face, neck, breasts and abdomen. "These are the most frequently targeted parts of the body", he said.

The highlight event to mark International Women's Day was the staging of a health fair at the Castries City Hall, organized by the Department of Gender Relations. The fair showcased the skills and talents of women in several areas and also focused on some of the services available to them in helping to maintain healthy lifestyles. 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Work Continues on an Integrated Export Strategy for St. Lucia.

The Ministry of Commerce, Invest ment and Consumer Affairs has joined forces with the St. Lucia Chamber of Commerce Industry and Agriculture and other stakeholders, in an attempt to put in place an Integrated National Export Development Strategy for St. Lucia. The process, which has been underway for the past two-years, was taken one step further on Monday, 8th March 2004 with the staging of a national symposium at the Green Parrot Hotel situated at La Toc.

Addressing participants, who came from a wide cross section of the industrial and manufacturing sector, Executive Director of the Chamber Mr. Brian Louisy, said that the grouping remained convinced that one of the things impacting negatively on the local economy has been the slowdown in export. He pointed out that one could trace from as far back as the days of sugar, coal, bananas and tourism, St. Lucas's export led growth.

This, he told his audience had changed not entirely due to a noticeable lack of export, but because "export-led growth was no longer sexy". Mr. Louisy made it

clear that the rational behind this latest initiative was to make export-led growth the theme and driving force behind St. Lucia's future economic development. "This process, we are hoping will make

such terms and ideas sexy once again so that people can buy into it", said the Chamber's long serving Executive Director.

The preparation of the strategy comes at an opportune time for St. Lucia, as the island through the Ministry of Commerce and Investment continues trade negotiations with groupings like the Caribbean Single Market and Economy, (CSME), the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA) and wider Europe.

Commerce and Investment Minister Honourable Philip J. Pierre said that given the changing face of trade the world over and its impacts on the local agriculture export market, new methodologies and modalities needed to be developed, if the country was to survive and remain competitive in this era of free trade.

St. Lucia he lamented, finds itself having to compete with countries that possess

greater economies of scale, coupled with large and wide open spaces and relatively cheap labour. Such conditions he noted, had led to cheaper bananas flooding the world market and curtailing growth in the local banana sector. "We cannot lie down and die", he told some of the country's leading manufacturers at the one-day symposium.

As a remedy, the Commerce Minister indicated that the country needed to speed up its efforts at diversification, which in itself had given rise to initiatives leading to the development of a national export strategy. "We must find ways and means to make St. Lucia's export competitive, placing them at an affordable price", he said, noting that success on that front was contingent on the country's ability to deal with the vast world market and the phenomenon of free trade.

Last year some 38% of St. Lucia's manufacturing output, specifically food and beverage were exported, with officials hoping to up that figure significantly come the next five years. Monday's exercise received assistance from the International Trade Centre (ITC) in the person of consultant Anton Said.

Mrs Popo also called for a re-thinking of their attitude to change. 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Cruise Industry Alive and Well – Minister Pierre

St. Lucia's cruise industry is poised for continued growth and we must feel good about that", said Minister of Commerce, Tourism, Investment and Consumer Affairs, Phillip J. Pierre.

And on what evidence does Minister Pierre's feel good sentiments hold? Statistics from 1999 to 2003 show continued improvement in the numbers, particularly in the size of the ships and the number of passengers they bring. And since the start of this year, the figures continue to hold their own, with some 64 cruise ships calling in January and 53 in February. In March, when traditionally, the numbers begin to fall, some 38 ships are expected to make calls, and by May through to September the average number of calls dwindles to approximately 10 a month.

Moreover, there have been assurances from the cruise association in Miami that the cruise tax is not the issue. "What the executives are saying", Minister Pierre said "is that we want you to continue to give us a good product, diversify it, we need security, attractions and we need playfields where they (cruise passengers) can enjoy themselves. We want to be able to purchase souvenirs and St. Lucian products".

Minister Pierre said further, "They were not telling me about the cruise levy; that was not the issue. I want to tell you that the cruise industry is alive and well in St. Lucia. What is happening to us is that there are some home porting problems in Puerto Rico. We sit here and make pronouncements not understanding that St. Lucia is part of a global picture. St. Lucia is not alone in the world. What the cruise association in Miami is saying to me is that the problem with the cruise industry is that the home port is in Puerto Rico".

comes from Puerto Rico and down to the Eastern Caribbean and "they (the cruise association in Miami) are saying to me that there are problems in Puerto Rico. That is why the carnival vessel may not make the calls in St. Lucia that it ought to. It is not because of the cruise levy or tax; it is because of the logistical situation in Puerto Rico that makes the cruise unable to come to St. Lucia".

Minister Pierre said however: "But they (the cruise association in Miami) assured me that the St. Lucia product is fine; the cruise industry appreciates what St. Lucia is doing, and the Government's commitment to the process of cruise conversion, whereby we can get our passengers to come and visit St. Lucia. So I want to allay all the fears in the country that the cruise industry is alive and well and the tourism industry will develop between stay-over visitors and cruise visitors; we need both of them".

He contends that St. Lucia will be better off when it can create value-added products for the cruise industry, in terms of money staying in St. Lucia. He called for a feel good attitude in St. Lucia instead

with the world; we cannot become myopic or insular; we cannot tie ourselves in a particular mindset; our competition is the world and we have to have standards".

Speaking at the launch of Frootsy's new product line at Point Seraphine, Minister Pierre informed that at the highest standards mark on it a cruise passenger will spend on it, thereby adding value and that is where we have to go instead of dealing with the negativity or what sounds good".
